

# Welcoming Syrian newcomers

To date, more than thirteen thousand Syrian newcomers have arrived in Canada through Toronto Pearson. In December, Toronto Pearson began to prepare its Infield Terminal (IFT) to support government-sponsored Syrian refugee flights to Toronto.

Ahead of the first flight, the GTAA worked tirelessly to get the facility up and running and to accommodate the unique requirements of this operation and also make the space more welcoming for the Syrian newcomers. This included everything from Arabic signage to children's play areas.

The GTAA is proud of the role it is able to play in welcoming newcomers and enhancing their first impressions of Canada. We were pleased to welcome elected officials during the month of December for numerous arriving Syrian newcomer flights.

# **Air Services**

This month, **Brussels Airlines** will be starting service from Toronto Pearson. The airline will offer greater connectivity to numerous destinations in Europe and Africa.

**Wow Air**, a low-cost Icelandic air carrier, will begin operations out of Toronto Pearson in May. This will be the second airline to offer service to Iceland from Toronto.

This month, WestJet is launching new routes to Boston Logan and London International (Ontario). Jet Airways will also be commencing a service to Amsterdam (Schiphol).

In May, **WestJet** will begin offering service to Washington Dulles and London Gatwick.

Also in May, **Air Canada** will launch a seasonal service to London Gatwick, Prague and Portland, Oregon, along with year-round service to Jacksonville, Florida, Salt Lake City and Incheon, Korea.

**Delta** will also be launching a year-round service to Salt Lake City in May.

In June, **Air Canada** will begin offering seasonal summer service to Budapest, Glasgow and Warsaw.

Also in June, **Air Transat** will be offering summer service to Zagreb, Croatia.

**WestJet** will be launching year-round service to Nashville and Los Angeles in June as well.

### **Transit advocacy**

The area surrounding Toronto Pearson is the second largest employment zone in Canada – with more jobs than the central business districts of Montreal, Vancouver and Calgary. Thousands of passengers also travel to and from the airport each day – and almost all of these people use cars.

As Southern Ontario continues to grow economically and in population size, it requires better transit and connectivity to keep people and goods moving.

The GTAA is advocating for better transit to the airport region and working with local employers to develop a coalition that can work with all levels of government to improve transit connectivity to the area.

It is also providing employees with information on how they can get involved in the conversation and participate in public consultation activities.

In February, Urban Strategies Inc., a Toronto urban design firm, published a report commissioned by the GTAA, called <u>Pearson</u> <u>Connects: A Multi-Modal Hub to Prosperity</u>, which examines the economic, social and environmental benefits of a multi-modal hub travel hub located at Toronto Pearson.

This report follows an earlier white paper by Urban Strategies, <u>Toronto Pearson: Growth</u>, <u>Connectivity, Capacity. The future of a key</u> <u>regional asset</u>, outlining projected growth in air travel demand Southern Ontario.

## **Update on Toronto Pearson's redevelopment**

2015 was a busy year for the airport's redevelopment program. In Terminal 3, screening was consolidated and moved to east screening with eight lanes for CATSA. In June 2015, Pier A opened, marking one of the first major milestones to be completed in the redevelopment program. Pier A handles much of WestJet's domestic departures and arrivals as well as some international departures. In fact, approximately 2.9 million passengers per year are expected to pass through Gates B1-B5 in Terminal 3.

Another major project is Security in Advance (SIA) in both terminals. This collective work of the GTAA, government agencies, security, airlines, and other airport tenants is no small feat. In Terminal 1, projects are just starting to be noticed and the SIA redevelopment is beginning to gain traction. By spring 2016, pre-clearance at Toronto Pearson will be fully transitioned to meet the United States Customs and Border Protection's new design standard.


In Terminal 3, SIA has been completed, including the implementation of 10 new self-serve bag drops within the transborder check-in process. Baggage handling system (BHS) trials were completed prior to Christmas, with the new BHS now fully operational as of January 14.

The new retail area in Terminal 3 Node C and the new central pre-board screening construction is ongoing with a June 2016 completion date, offering more than 18,300 square feet of shops, restaurants and services will be added postsecurity.

Each of these projects is integral to enhancing our passengers' experience and making Toronto Pearson the best airport in the world.

### Comparison of Aircraft Movements and Noise Complaints by Runway Operation

From January to December 2015, there were 443,353 aircraft movements at Toronto Pearson, resulting in 24,530 complaints from 1,575 complainants, of which 19,268 complaints were related to aircraft arrivals and 5,134 were related to aircraft departures. Of the total complaints, 128 complaints were unrelated to runway operations.
